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Figurative language, such as metaphors and personification, deviates from the literal meaning of words in order to produce more interesting writing. It evokes comparison, heightens emphasis, and clarifies a new way of stating an idea or description.

Types of Figurative Language for Better Writing

Bullying is serious and everything we do, in actions and with words both directly and indirectly affect others positively and negatively. The labels we place on each other stick, and words can hurt. Be kind to one another; if you don't have anything nice to say, don't say anything at all; If others have negative things to say, never be afraid to speak up to them.

An Anti-Bullying Metaphor

Figurative language is not meant to convey literal meanings, and often it compares one concept with another in order to make the first concept easier to understand. However, it links the two ideas or concepts with the goal of influencing the audience to understand the link, even if it does not exist.
