During each visit to a clinician, patients complete assessments to inform their provider about their current conditions. Each of these assessments creates a profile for the patient about their current and ongoing symptoms.

One of the challenges of working as a clinician with people in pain is measuring outcomes. Pain is an experience, and as a result, it cannot be directly measured. Instead, we use surrogate measures like a VAS, McGill Pain Questionnaire and functional assessments to make an assessment of the severity of someone's complaint.

What Is A Good Outcome In Pain Management? - Beyond ...

In an effort to change the practice of acute pain management, the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO) mandated in 1991 that pain be routinely assessed and outcomes of care routinely documented for terminally ill patients, but not for other patient populations experiencing acute or chronic pain.

Changing Acute Pain Management to Improve Patient Outcomes ...

Effective management of acute pain results in improved patient outcomes and increased patient satisfaction. Although research and advanced treatments in improved practice protocols have documented progressive improvements in management of acute and postoperative pain, little awareness of the effectiveness of best practices persists.

Measuring Clinical Outcomes of Chronic Pain Patients A new simplified, easy-to-use, self-reporting score card, SPAASMS, measures changes in activity/mobility, pain medication levels, physician/ER visits, sleep quality, mood, and medication side-effects.

Improving Postoperative Pain Outcomes (Page 2)

Pain management is a vital component in the recovery of postoperative patients. Pain can diminish a patient's ability to participate in postoperative interventions such as coughing, deep breathing, and ambulating. These interventions are key elements in preventing postoperative complications.

On May 10, the Pain Management Best Practices Inter-Agency Task Force voted on its final recommendations, which emphasize the importance of providing balanced, individualized, patient-centered pain management to ensure better clinical outcomes for pain that improve quality of life and functionality for patients.

Patient-Centered Care Is Key to Best Practices in Pain ...

Patient describes satisfactory pain control at a level less than 3 to 4 on a rating scale of 0 to 10. Patient displays improved well-being such as baseline levels for pulse, BP, respirations, and relaxed muscle tone or body posture. Patient uses pharmacological and nonpharmacological pain-relief strategies.

Chronic pain costs the nation up to \$635 billion each year in medical treatment and lost productivity. The 2010 Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act required the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) to enlist the Institute of Medicine (IOM) in examining pain as a public health problem. In this report, the IOM offers a blueprint for action in transforming prevention, care, education, and research, with the goal of providing relief for people with pain in America. To reach the vast multitude of people with various types of pain, the nation must adopt a population-level prevention and management strategy. The IOM recommends that HHS develop a comprehensive plan with specific goals, actions, and timeframes. Better data are needed to help shape efforts, especially on the groups of people currently underdiagnosed and undertreated, and the IOM encourages federal and state agencies and private organizations to accelerate the collection of data on pain incidence, prevalence, and treatments. Because pain varies from patient to patient, healthcare providers should increasingly aim at tailoring pain care to each person's experience, and self-management of pain should be promoted. In addition, because there are major gaps in knowledge about pain across health care and society alike, the IOM recommends that federal agencies and other stakeholders redesign education programs to bridge these gaps. Pain is a major driver for visits to physicians, a major reason for taking medications, a major cause of disability, and a key factor in quality of life and productivity. Given the burden of pain in human lives, dollars, and social consequences, relieving pain should be a national priority.
