The different stages of dementia - Which?

Stage 1 of dementia can also be classified as the normal functioning stage. At this stage of dementia development, a patient generally does not exhibit any significant problems with memory, or any cognitive impairment. Stages 1-3 of dementia progression are generally known as "pre-dementia" stages. Stage 2: Age Associated Memory Impairment. This stage features occasional lapses of memory most frequently seen in:

The Seven Stages of Dementia Stage 1: No impairment. Everyone starts at stage 1 with no symptoms of cognitive impairment. Mental function is normal. Stage 2: Very mild cognitive decline. Stage 2 can vary between typical age-related memory problems that most seniors face, such as forgetting specific dates or slower recall of a name or word.
