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This is a general theory of cognitive development. Most of the original work was done in the context of language learning in children (Vygotsky, 1962), although later applications of the framework have been broader (see Wertsch, 1985). Example. Vygotsky (1978, p56) provides the example of pointing a finger. Initially, this behavior begins as a meaningless grasping motion; however, as people react to the gesture, it becomes a movement that has meaning.

Vygotsky ' s theory does not mean that anything can be taught to any child. Only instruction and activities that fall within the zone promote development. For example, if a child cannot identify the sounds in a word even after many prompts, the child may not

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benefit immediately from instruction in this skill.

## Classroom Applications of Vygotsky's Theory

Vygotsky ' s Social Development Theory is the work of Russian psychologist Lev Vygotsky (1896-1934) [1][2]. Vygotsky ' s work was largely unkown to the West until it was published in 1962.

Vygotsky ' s theory is one of the foundations of constructivism. It asserts three major themes regarding social interaction, the more knowledgeable other, and the zone of proximal development.

## Social Development Theory (Vygotsky) - Learning Theories

The main assertion of the Vygotsky theory is that cognitive development in early childhood is advanced through social interaction with other people, particularly those who are more



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skilled. In other words, Vygotsky believed that social learning comes before cognitive development in children, and that children construct knowledge actively.

With the exception of some large classes, students actively engage with their teacher and with each other. Collaborating with peers is encouraged but cannot be over-used, as it may actually cause stagnant growth in some cases.

Vygotsky (1962) examined how our social environments influence the learning process. He suggested that learning takes place through the interactions students have with their peers, teachers, and other experts. Consequently, teachers can create a learning environment that maximizes the learner's ability to interact with each other through discussion, collaboration, and feedback. Moreover, Vygotsky (1962) argues that culture is the primary determining factor for knowledge construction.

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Vygotsky was probably the first modern day theorist to fully consider the meaning and value of play in children ' s lives, and to recognise how the learning that occurs as a result of children ' s participation in play is ' socially constructed ' – that is, their learning does not occur in isolation from their surrounding environment, which includes places, things and, perhaps most importantly, people.
