Overview A growing body of evidence indicates that access to safe drinking-water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) services has an important positive impact on nutrition. Achieving the six Global Nutrition Targets 2025, as well as global goals for WASH and health, will require greater investments in nutrition and WASH.

**Improving nutrition outcomes with better water, sanitation**

Almost 1 billion people lack access to safe drinking water. More than 2.3 billion people lack access to safe sanitation. And 892 million people practice open defecation, meaning they have no sanitation facilities at all. Improving nutrition requires far more than improving the quality and quantity of food.

**The Impact of Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene on Nutrition**

Nutrition and Water, Sanitation and Hygiene. Proper sanitation and hygiene and safe drinking water can reduce undernutrition and stunting in children by preventing diarrhoeal and parasitic diseases, and damage to intestinal development (environmental enteropathy). According to the World Health Organization, roughly 50% of all malnutrition is associated with repeated diarrhoea or intestinal worm infections as a direct result of inadequate water, sanitation and hygiene.

Water, sanitation, and hygiene plays a key role in reducing malnutrition, as evidence across low and middle-income countries shows that higher open defecation rates are associated with stunting and higher overall incidence of poverty.

Making water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) nutrition sensitive does not require a paradigm shift.Rather, it requires that interventionists and program planners adhere to WASH behavioral objectives and align programs with the multiple pathways of feco-oral transmission relevant to the target population.

Having clean water and sanitation means being able to avoid exposure to countless diseases. Every year, millions of people die from diseases caused by inadequate water supply, sanitation, and hygiene. Other than pneumonia, diarrhea is the main cause of death in children under age 5.

**Tapping the Benefits of Clean Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene**

The World Health Organization estimates that 50 percent of malnutrition is associated with repeated diarrhea or intestinal worm infections from unsafe water or poor sanitation or hygiene. 2 Stunting can stem from enteropathy, a chronic illness caused by inflammation that keeps the body from absorbing calories and nutrients.

**Water, Sanitation, Hygiene, and Malnutrition in India**

Improving access to safe water and sanitation facilities leads to healthier families and communities. However, when people are also motivated to practice good hygiene - especially hand-washing with soap - health benefits are significantly increased. Because the evidence on the importance of hand-washing with soap is clear, UNICEF has made it a programme priority.

The three main underlying causes of undernutrition, namely unavailtable or insufficient food intake, poor care practices, and infectious diseases, are directly or indirectly related to inadequate access to water, sanitation facilities, and hygiene practices (WASH).
